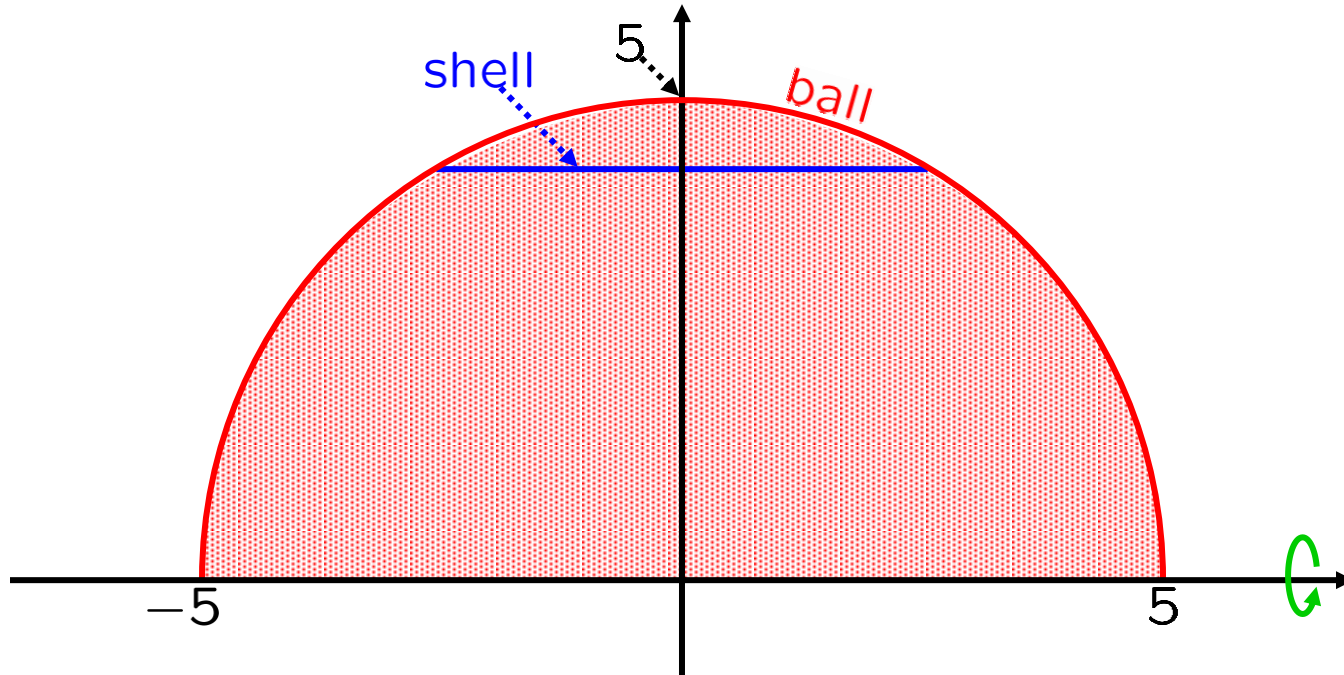
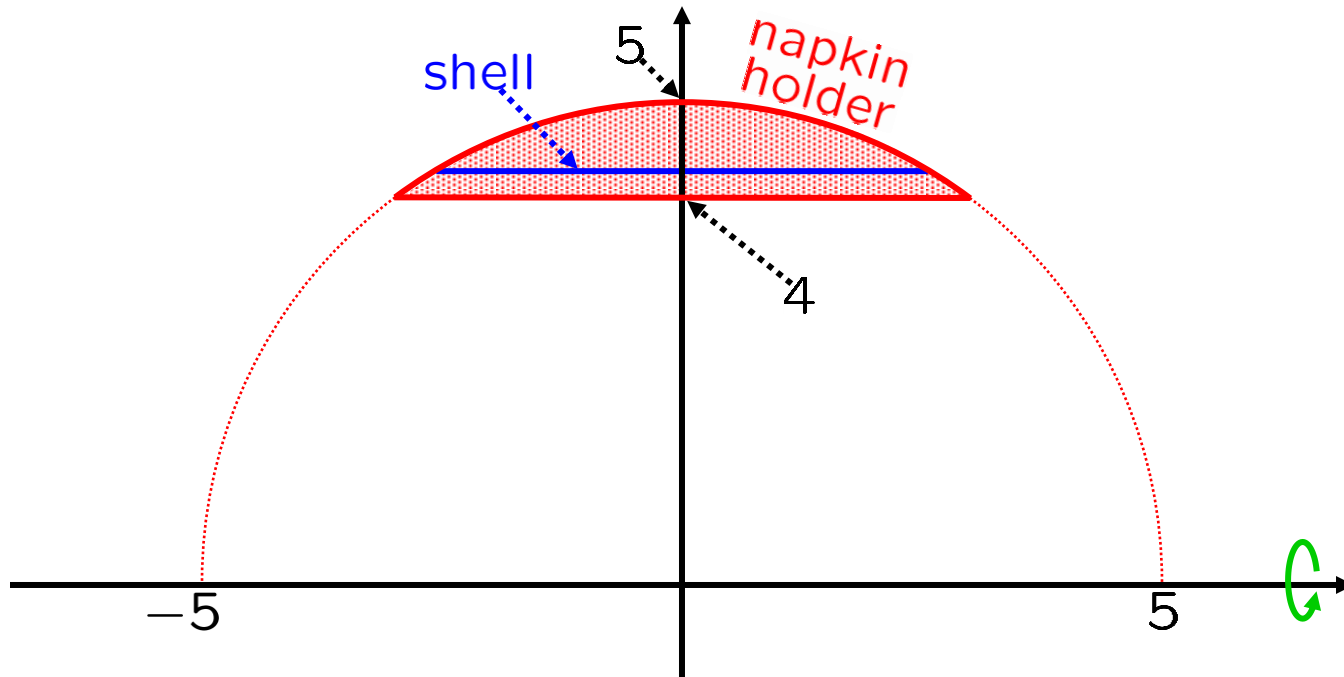

Volume by cylindrical shells:
Problems

0750-1. Using the shell method, find the volume in a ball of radius 5, following the diagram shown below.



0750-2. We create a napkin holder by drilling
a cylindrical hole of radius 4 through the
middle of a ball of radius 5, as shown below.
Using the shell method, find its volume.



0750-3. Let R be the region bounded by

OLD

$$y = (x - 1)^2(x - 2)^2 \text{ and } y = 4.$$

- a. Sketch R .
- b. Using whatever method you prefer, set up an integral to compute the volume of the solid obtained by rotating R about the x -axis. Do not evaluate the integral.
- c. Using whatever method you prefer, set up an integral to compute the volume of the solid obtained by rotating R about the y -axis. Do not evaluate the integral.
- d. Using whatever method you prefer, set up an integral to compute the volume of the solid obtained by rotating R about the line $x = -1$. Do not evaluate the integral.

0750-4. OLD Let R be the region bounded by

$$x = 1 + e^{-y^2}, x = 0, y = 1 \text{ and } y = 2.$$

- a. Sketch R .
- b. Using whatever method you prefer, find the volume of the solid obtained by rotating R about the x -axis.

0750-5. OLD Let R be the region bounded by

$$x = y^2 + y, x = 0, y = 1 \text{ and } y = 2.$$

- a. Sketch R .
- b. Using whatever method you prefer, find the volume of the solid obtained by rotating R about the line $x = -1$.

0750-6. Let R be the region bounded by
 $x = \sin y$, $x = 0$, $y = \pi/4$ and $y = 3\pi/4$.

Set up, but do not evaluate, an integral that yields the volume of the solid obtained by rotating R about the line $y = \pi$.

0750-7. Describe the solid of revolution whose volume is given by

$$2\pi \int_1^2 x \left[\left(e^{5x} \right) - \left(\cos(\pi x) \right) \right] dx.$$

Do not evaluate this integral.

0750-8. Describe the solid of revolution whose volume is given by

$$2\pi \int_1^2 [x + 3] \left[\left(e^{5x} \right) - \left(\cos(\pi x) \right) \right] dx.$$

Do not evaluate this integral.
