1. (20 points) Use spherical coordinates to give a parametrization of the ellipsoid determined by the equation  $x^2 + 4y^2 + 9z^2 = 1$ .

In spherical words, 
$$X = \rho \cos \Theta \sin \phi$$
  
 $y = \rho \sin \Theta \sin \phi$   
 $z = \rho \cos \phi$ 

so the equation becomes

$$(\rho \cos\theta \sin\phi)^{2} + 4(\rho \sin\theta \sin\phi)^{2} + 9(\rho \cos\phi)^{2} = 1$$

$$\rho^{2} \left(\cos^{2}\theta \sin^{2}\phi + 4\sin^{2}\theta \sin^{2}\phi + 9\cos^{2}\phi\right) = 1$$

 $\rho = \int \frac{1}{\cos^2 \theta \sin^2 \theta + 4 \sin^2 \theta \sin^2 \theta + 9 \cos^2 \theta}$

2. (25 points) Suppose we have a fluid in  $\mathbb{R}^3$  with flow given by the vector field F(x,y,z) = (x,y,1). Suppose we have a surface parametrized by  $\phi(u,v) = (u+v,v,uv)$  for  $0 \le u \le 1$ ,  $2 \le v \le 3$ . Find the total rate of flow of fluid through this surface (in the direction given by the normal vector of this parametrization).

and so the surface integral is

$$F \cdot dS = \begin{cases} 3 \\ F(u+v,v,uv) \cdot (-v,v-u,1) & dv du \end{cases}$$

$$= \begin{cases} 3 \\ (u+v,v,1) \cdot (-v,v-u,1) & dv du \end{cases}$$

$$= \begin{cases} 3 \\ (u+v,v,1) \cdot (-v,v-u,1) & dv du \end{cases}$$

$$= \begin{cases} 3 \\ (v-uv^{2})^{3} & du = \begin{cases} 3 \\ 3 \\ 0 \end{cases} = (3-9n) - (2-4u) du = \begin{cases} (1-5u) du \\ 0 \end{cases}$$

$$= \begin{cases} (u-\frac{5}{2}u)^{3} & du = \frac{5}{2} \\ 1 & du \end{cases}$$

3. (20 points) Evaluate the integral

$$\iiint_D e^{x^2+y^2} dx \, dy \, dz$$

over the region described by the equations  $x^2+y^2 \le 2$ ,  $1 \le z \le 5$ .

4. (25 points) Let D be the region in  $\mathbb{R}^2$  bounded by the curves  $x+y=2, \ x+y=4, \ x-y=0, \ x-y=4$ . Use the change of coordinates  $x=u+v, \ y=u-v$  to evaluate the integral

$$\iint_{D} \frac{x-y}{x+y} \, dx \, dy.$$
The Jacobian determinant of this change is
$$\left| \frac{\partial(xy)}{\partial(yy)} \right| = \left| \frac{1}{2} \left( -2 \right) \right| = 2.$$
We have  $x+y=2n$ ,  $x-y=2v$ .



6. (25 points) Let C be the perimeter of the triangle in  $\mathbb{R}^3$  with vertices (1,0,3), (2,0,3), and (1,1,3) in order. If  $F(x,y,z)=(xe^x,y^3+x^2,xz)$ , use Stokes' theorem to evaluate the line integral

$$\int_{C} F \cdot ds$$
.
To use Stokes theorem, first we find  $cwl(F)$  =

$$\operatorname{cirl}(F) = \begin{cases} i & j & k \\ 2/3x & 2/3y & 2/3z \\ x^{2} & x^{2} & x^{2} \end{cases} = \begin{pmatrix} 0, -2, 2x \end{pmatrix}$$

Next, we parametrize this triangle.
All the points lie in the plane Z=3, and so we can use the parametrization [b(u,v) = (u,v,3).



The normal vector for this param. is calculated by:  $T_{4} = (1,0,0) \qquad T_{7} = (0,1,0) \qquad n = \begin{pmatrix} i & j & k \\ i & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & i & 0 \end{pmatrix} = (0,0,1)$ which is in the correct direction for Stakes' theorem.
The integral, by stokes theorem, is

$$\int_{1}^{2} cw f(x) dx = \int_{1}^{2} \int_{0}^{2-u} (0,3,2u) \cdot (0,0,1) dv du = \int_{1}^{2} \int_{0}^{2-u} 2u dx du$$

$$= \int_{1}^{2} 2u(2-u) du = \int_{1}^{2} 4u - 2u^{2} du$$

$$= \left(2u^{2} - \frac{2}{3}u^{3}\right)\Big|_{1}^{2} = \left(8 - \frac{16}{3}\right) - \left(2 - \frac{2}{3}\right)$$

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
